## OVER THE TOP...

## 1600 MILES AND A MONTH LATER...

The World Youth Team Championship (covered amply by Eric Schiller elsewhere in this issue) followed by the University of Chicago International kept us on the campus of the U of C for a month running, almost without interruption. We logged over 1600 miles from airport to campus and back to Western Springs in that period, had the great opportunity to meet young players from Kuwait to Scotland--and in between. Would we do it again? Ask me in a year or two!

The U of C International succeeded in producing the IM norm for New Englander Jim Rizzitano! Congratulations to this talented and personable young player! Some of our local players came close--and gained invaluable experience in the process: Al Chow and Leonid Kaushansky finished with a plus score in this strong field. Marvin Dandridge, Ed Friedman, Gene Scott, and Indiana neighbor Lester Van Meter participated. (You'll see coverage in a coming issue.) Your president, with much assistance from the American Chess Foundation and the USCF, as well as from YOU via the ICA, its officers and other personnel, organized. Players from Scotland, Puerto Rico, Canada, and France joined our U.S. participants. A recent note from IM John Watson congratulated us on making Illinois a "third area of master-level chess", next to--where else? New York and California. The applause belongs to the ICA rather than its president. The time is not far away when we shall congratulate more than one of our local players on achieving the IM title.

## FROM THE EDITOR

For the editor, it was a tremendously exciting experience. As the editor, I have some real problems. 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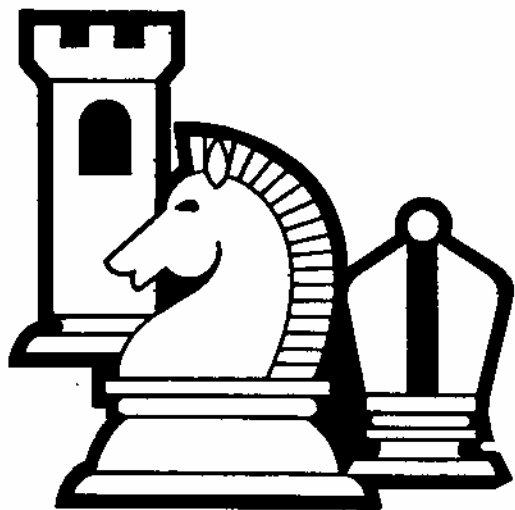

#### COMING TOUR EVENTS:

IL CLASS (Maxi), MORGAN PARK MARATHON, AND OLD FASH IONED SWISS (Chess Mates) (Mini).

Prizes will be awarded at the end of the tour by ICA to the top twenty (20) championship point winners and to the top thirty (30) class point winners (6 in each class) based upon the total number of points amassed during the tour. Players must play in at least three tour events to be eligible for prizes. Points are split in case of ties.

Tour points accumulate for a player whose rating moves UP to a higher class, and the player remains eligible for prizes in the lower class based on points earned prior to moving into the higher class. Tour points DO NOT accumulate DOWNWARD from one class to another. For purposes of tour points, a player's rating is that which is used for the particular tournament.

THE 4TH WORLD YOUTH TEAM CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP

AS RELATED BY ERIC SCHILLER

In the beginning there was nothing, as far as FIDE was concerned. That is, the United States had not held a single world Championship event in the nearly 60 years of FIDE's existence. For this we get 3 Interzonal participants? Something clearly had to be done.

It all started in February when I was conversing with Florencio Campomanes, the President of FIDE. I innocently inquired as to where the World Youth Team Championship would be held in 1983, since I wanted to repeat my performance as Captain of the American team (in Graz, 1981 - ed.) He advised me that the federations who had taken options on the event had all pulled out, so no event would be held, unless...perhaps the US would be interested? Well, with only 6 months lead time it did seem a rather far fetched idea, but I didn't want to admit that so I made a lame statement about looking into the possibility of hosting it here in Chicago. I had had previous conversations with the Director of International House about the possibility of hosting chess events at the magnificent facilities built in the 20's by John D. Rockefeller to promote international friendship. This event seemed a natural, since it brought together young (under 26) players from all over the world. I thought that there might be an outside chance of holding the tournament if I could arrange room and board at reasonable cost, since the players are only required to pay \$6.00 per day under FIDE statutes. International House was enthusiastic about the idea and agreed to help sponsor the event at very generous rates. Having taken the plunge, it was time to start swimming.

The USCF policy board also unanimously approved the activity, with a \$7500 grant and the offer of FIDE liason and technical support. What was a mere dream had become a reality - Chicago would host the games, bringing a FIDE World Championship to the US for the first time.

As preparations continued support was gained from a number of important sources. The ACF approved a \$5000.00 grant, and substantial donations were received from Norbert Leopoldi and Cloverline, Inc. Despite the upcoming (but eventually aborted) Kasparov - Korchnoi match, the top brass of the USCF took an active interest in the proceedings. Diana Masker and Randy Hough worked hard at New Windsor to communicate with all the parties involved and provided fantastic assistance. Jim Redman provided advice and Helen Warren put the ICA machinery into motion, helping to raise a significant amount of funds. Dick Verber sent out a mailing and Kevin Bachler took care of publicity.

Although the first round did not take place until August 22, the event really began on the 19th, when the Soviet, Swiss, and Finnish delegations arrived at the airport, met by Jim and Helen Warren, Mr. & Mrs. Marvin Rogan, Eric Schiller, and Phil Cotton, whose photos grace the pages of this issue. Tom McCormack was soon added to the driving team, and Tom Fineberg helped out too. At the receiving end Donald Vance, Carolyn Jenkins, John Lomas and the author of these lines (a TD must be able to be in two places at one, after all!) were waiting ready to usher the players to their rooms and provide a taste

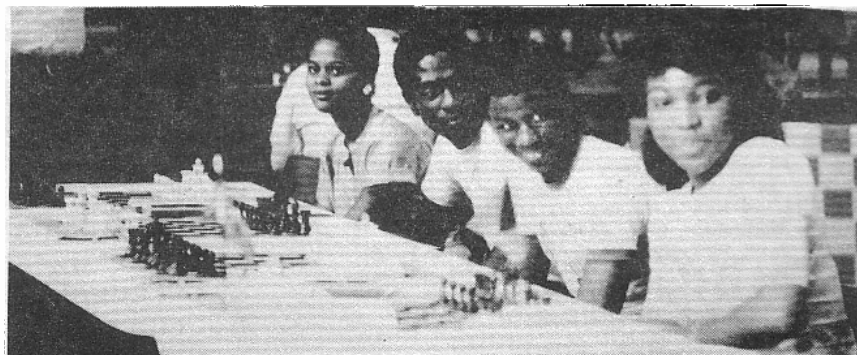

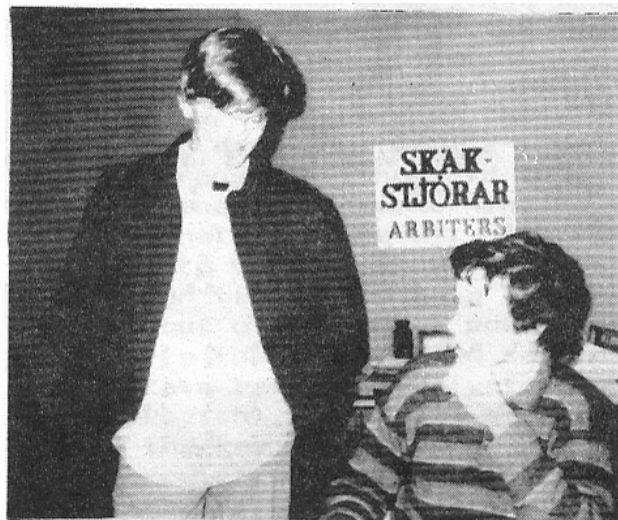

the reader can follow the progress of the teams by examining the crosstable in this issue, so I won't bother with a round by round summary. Instead, I'll just highlight the results:

The team from the USSR was so strong that no one really expected a serious challenge. They just plain ran away with the tournament, winning board prizes on boards 2-5 (more next issue about that!). Germany started slowly but picked up steam when Eric Lobron finally arrived and plowed his way to the first board prize. The players from Iceland were hungry, since they missed out last time through a slip up: they never knew about the invitation!. They were the only team to hold the Soviets to a draw - not losing a single game! Perhaps the fact that they did not drink until after the final round (but boy did they party then!) had something to do with their fine result. The USA seems to be in a rut. Three out of four times they have finished just out of the medal positions. Despite the help of two Leonids (Captain Bass and analyst Shamkovich), they just didn't win the key games. John Fedorowicz was the standout performer. Despite strained relations the Peoples Republic of China sent a team to participate here in the U.S. The team consisted of three seasoned pros and three newcomers, but most opposing teams knew that the young team would be dangerous. China is finally becoming a major power in world chess. The home country fielded a second side, and the USA B team finished just behind the first team! A most creditable result for Vince McCambridge and his colleagues. Argentina had the benefit of a fairly easy schedule and scored heavily against the weaker teams to earn 7th place. They were followed by Finland, who were ranked 18th but showed tremendous fighting

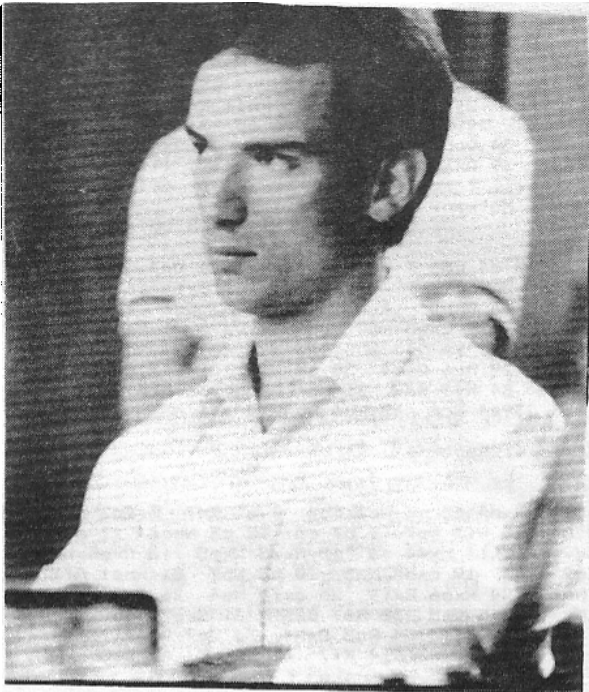

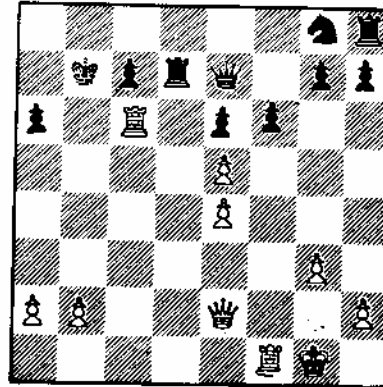

UNDER THE MICROSCOPE BY ALBERT CHOW

One of the most exhausting games I have ever played was my game against IM Leonid Bass at this year's Master Challenge tournament. Bass wanted nothing less than a win, because Brooks had beaten Dandridge and had five points. The game was around seven and a half hours long. And to put the icing on the cake the air conditioner broke down with the temperature about 97 degrees outside. Bass played brilliantly, my position was lousy, and I felt like I was in burning hell. But then...a miracle occurred!

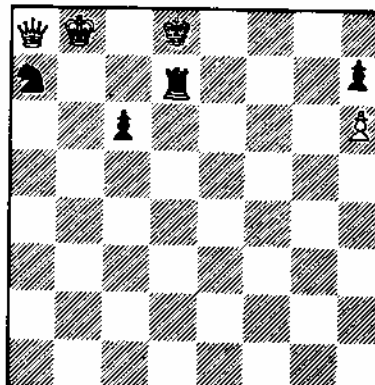

Bass has a tremendous amount of experience with the Nimzo Indian, Queen's Indian, Benoni, etc. so I decided to try an unusual line I've had great results with. 3 Nf3 Alternative moves are 3 cd, 3 Nc3, 3 e3. 3...Bg4 4 cd White decides to clarify the central situation. Also possible are 4 e3, 4 Nc3, 4 Qa4.) 4...Bxf3 5 dc Sharper play arises after 5 gf Qxd5 6 e3 e5! 7 Nc3 Bb4. 5 ef is playable too. 5...Bxc6 6 Nc3 e6 6...Nf6 7 f3 e5! is another way of attacking White's center. 7 e4 Bb4 B f3 Qh4+! 8...f5 9 Bc4! is a strong gambit for White. This strange queen check disrupts White's normal development, gaining time to attack the center. (Ed. Note: According to Watson's monograph 8...Qh4+ was suggested by New Yorker Ken Lerner.) 9 g3 Qf6 9...Qh5!? 10 Be3 0-0-0 11 Bd3 Ba5! 12 0-0 Bb6 13 e5 Qe7 14 Be4 Bxe4 15 fe 15 Nxe4 16 is equal 15...f6 15...Bxd4 (As suggested by Watson - ed.) 16 Bxd4 c5 17 Nb5 and Black is busted. 16 Qe2! An excellent move, keeping the initiative. 16 ef Nf6 lets Black develop smoothly. 16...Bxd4 16...fe 17 de gives White isolated e-pawns but leaves the Black knight no good squares while White threatens Nacl and Nb5. 17 Bxd4! 17 Nb5 fe! isn't dangerous: 18 Nxa7+ Kb8 19 Nb5 Nf6 or 18 Racl c6 19 Nxa7+ Kb8 20 Nc6 bc 21 Rxc6 Qb7 favor Black. 17...Rxd4 18 Nb5 Rd7 19 Rac1! 19 ef Nxf6 20 Nxa7+ Kb8 21 Nb5 Qc5+ 22 Kh1 Qe5 23 Nc3 Rhd8 regains material but loses everything else. 19 Nxa7+ kb8 20 Nb5 fe 21 Qf2 b6 and Black soon consolidates. 19...ab 19...fe 20 Qf2 and 19...kb8 20 Qf2 b6 21 Nd4 are both bad. 20 Nd6+! Besides, I didn't see why 22...Qb4 didn't hold the game. Believe it or not, I can't find a forced win for White after Black takes the rook, although there are lots of draws by perpetual check. 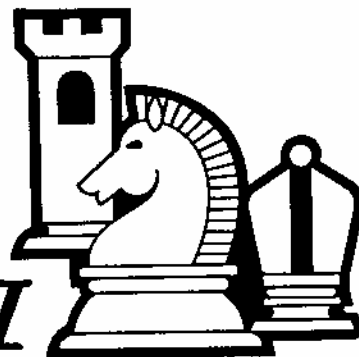

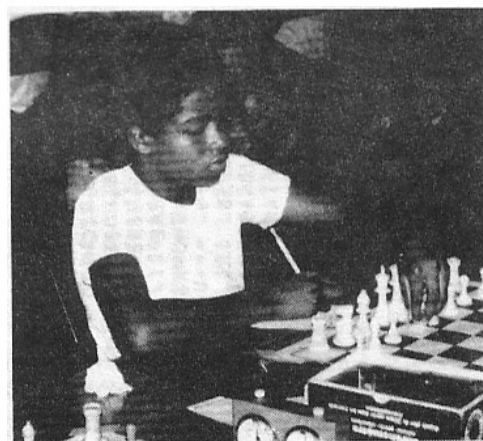

Except for the failure of the air conditioning, which forced us to scare up some large fans, this was a great tournament. We had 165 players, who managed to consume 90 pounds of corned beef, 20 pounds of roast beef, 40 pounds of various sausages, 35 loaves of bread, 144 hard rolls, and 15 pounds of cheese as well as jello molds, cole slaw, and potato salad. (That's a lotta salami, kiddo. I pound of meat or cheese per person, and that's assuming no vegetarians / Hoo-hah! - ed.) We served over 1000 cups of coffee, lemonade and milk over the 2-day event. (So chessplayers really are heavy drinkers - ed.)

We gave away a dozen leather USCF key cases (some with folding money inside), 18 chess books, 3 radio Rolls-Royces, 3 globe banks, four free entries to the Illinois Open, World Youth Team Championship posters, a Druke chess set and board, and some other raffle prizes. RAE Products and Chemicals donated \$1000.00 to make the tournament the success it was. We had enough food to feed everyone free for both days!

Peter Pelts and James Mills went 5-0 to win \$250.00 each (How could anyone concentrate on chess with all that food? - ed.). Mills commuted 345 miles from Muncie, Ind. and achieved his perfect score by defeating Morris Giles in the last round. The most interesting thing about the tournament was the number of new USCF (16) and ICA (30) members. RAE Chemicals gave free USLF memberships to the 16 neophytes. That's really helping the membership drive!

The chess reflected the spirit of the occasion. Of his 11th move in the game below, Richard Verber said that it wasn't sound but that the tournament brought out the "fun" in him. If you want to see a really wild game with the King leading the "charge", just play this game through!
